Bird of the Month - September Greater Yellowlegs





IDENTIFICATION

- Large shorebird with bright yellow legs
- · Gray-brown back with spots of white
- Bill is longer than the head is deep
- Nests mostly in the arctic but we see them in the spring and fall migration

FOOD

Feeds on insects, small fish, small frogs, snails and other small invertebrates

PREDATORS

 Adults are killed by raptors such as Peregrine Falcons and Northern Harriers.

BEHAVIORS AND FUN FACTS

- Habitat Can be found anywhere there is shallow water.
- Males and females look alike
- The very similar Lesser Yellowlegs is smaller, shorter billed and usually only seen in the fall
- Greater Yellowlegs call often with their doo-doo-doo call. The Lesser Yellowlegs gives a two note doo-doo call.
- Despite being one of our most common shorebirds in migration, their tendancy to nest in remote northern bogs makes them very hard to study
- Because of their long legs, Greater Yellowlegs can wade and feed in deeper water than most other shorebirds
