IDENTIFICATION

- Males are slightly smaller than females
- Bobs up and down near the edge of the water
- White line through the eye
- Breeding Season Gray and white with dark breast spots
- Non-breeding Gray and white without the spots
- Shallow, fast, fluttering wing beats in flight

FOOD

- Feed on small crustaceans, small insects and their larvae
- · True "shorebird", forages near the water's edge

PREDATORS

· Falcons, raccoons, skunks, crows and gulls

BEHAVIORS AND FUN FACTS

- Most widespread shorebird in North America
- Spends the winter in Mexico, S. America and along the coast
- Nest on the ground under vegetation near water
- · Reasons for the bobbing behavior not well understood
- Very similar to the Solitary Sandpiper so be careful
